

An old legend which comes to us from the Napoleonic Wars tells of a youth, too young to fight, who was permitted to carry the regimental banner. During one bitter engagement his unit was advancing on the enemy under heavy fire. In his youthful zeal the boy went so far ahead of the regiment that he was almost out of contact. The commanding officer sent a runner bearing the message, "Bring the standard back to the line." With heroic recklessness the lad sent back the ringing reply, "Bring the line up to the standard."

One Past Grand Master, Dwight Smith, wrote the following, and with your indulgence I will paraphrase some of it.

In all the land there is weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth. The Masonic Gimmick Manufacturing Company, Unlimited, is working overtime to devise stunts to "modernize" Freemasonry, to put it in line with ten thousand other organizations that clamor for the attention of the Tribal American. Among its many products we are urged to try these:

Abandon the "free will and accord" rule which has placed our Craft far above the mine rush of societies, and permit outright solicitation.

Imitate the service clubs. Get busy on "projects" galore in the best Babbitt fashion.

Go into the organized do-good business in a big way. Find an area of the human body that has not been exploited. Exploit it, set a quota, have a kick-off dinner, and ring the doorbells.

Subsidize other organizations right and left, and, in the doing, ignore, neglect and starve the parent body.

Hire press agents and to tell the world, like Little Jack Horner, what great boys we are. "Masonry is not getting its proper share of publicity," complained one Grand Master. Never mind actions; concentrate on words.

Imitate Hollywood. Stage an extravaganza. Bring in all the groups that ever fancied themselves remotely related to Freemasonry. Form the parade, blow the bugle, beat the drums and cheapen the Fraternity.

Let Freemasonry "take a position" on public issues of the day. Stand up and be counted assuming, of course, that the position the Craft takes is in line with our own pet prejudices.

Go all out for materialism. Raise money; spend it. Build temples, institutions. Subsidize; endow. Whatever can be had by writing a check, get it.

Centralize and pattern Freemasonry after Washington bureaucracy. Let nothing be done modestly by an individual or a Lodge; do everything on a state or national level the super-duper way. Make a great to-do about local self-govern-

ment, but accept no local self-responsibility.

Why does not someone suggest that we try Freemasonry? These words ring just as true today as they did when the author first published them in 1962, given our current state of affairs.

Brothers, I propose that we uphold the symbolic contracts made in our Beautiful Degrees by honoring the obligations we took at the altar of Freemasonry. All the Lodge meetings in the world cannot, nor will not replace the duties we owe each other, our widows, our Lodges, and the entire human family, who have each supported us all in their own way while we have enjoyed the benefits of this Great Fraternity. The shotgun approach that we have taken in regards to Masonry as suggested by Brother Smith is not working, and it is time to do something right, better than anyone could ever do it, then move on to other projects. One of our great shortfalls in regards to the Fraternity is our lack of commitment, that being we need to decide what we will do, take action on the idea, and follow through.

Let us always remember to perfect what needs to be perfected, and get back to our knitting, that being the basic tenets of our institution. Our zeal for quantity rather than quality has clouded our mind in such a way that our emotions are over riding sound judgment and the ones who are entrusted to our care are suffering for our vanity and pride.

We miss a great opportunity every time we perform a Masonic Funeral. We offer our condolences, and then slink back into our Lodges without sometimes the least thought of how we can be of service to this beloved Masonic Lady or her loved ones.

It is my contention that as we forget about them, they will forget about us and realize that they had been a Masonic Widow for years before their husbands had physically died. We are always screaming community service from the rooftops, but we overlook the fact that our Masonic Ladies are in and of themselves part of our communities. Remember once again our obligations to first serve our own members and their families,

then the entire human family. Skipping step one, and moving to step 3 will not get us closer to our goals, but farther away.

One dinner a year to honor our widows is good, but not enough and only a token gesture in my humble opinion. In our jurisdiction alone, it is estimated that at any given time there are several thousand widows or more floating in limbo. Who is taking care of those who took care of us? They are the bedrock and foundation of our lives and should be treated as such. It is up to us to search them out, find out what needs if any they have, and see that they are met. They are our responsibility until the day they die or remarry, and should always be treated with the respect and dignity that they earned. One widow was heard to say this, "my husband always told me that I would be taken care of if he ever died, it has been 10 years, but it is nice to finally hear from you." I will let you all be the judge of the truth and hopelessness in her words. Look deep within yourselves my Brothers and ask yourself one question, will my wife be looked after with the freedom, fervency, and zeal that Ancient Craft Masonry teaches? If the answer is no, then we have a larger problem than previously thought. We are all the leaders of our respective Lodge Craftsman, and the truth can pierce the heart as deep as the sword. In closing, one final thought

When good men are summoned to the highest and best within them, they usually respond with the highest and best. We might be pleasantly surprised at the reaction of our Brethren if challenged to bring the line up to the standard where it belongs!

From our Grand Lodge family to yours, have and make a Happy Holiday for your loved ones or someone else in need, for the gift given is greater than the one received. Thank you and may God Bless and always watch over this great Fraternity and over those who cannot watch over themselves.

GRAND LODGE OFFICE CLOSED

The Grand Lodge Office will be closed Thursday and Friday, December 24-25, 2009, for the Christmas Holiday and Friday, January 1, 2009, for New Years.

LODGE SECRETARIES

Soon it will be time to elect and install the officers who will lead your lodge for the ensuing year. I realize, with all the activity, plus the holidays, which are so plentiful during this time of year, how easy it is to overlook some of the routine functions

the lodge Secretaries must perform to keep our records current.

Listed below are several items that should be taken care of as soon as the information is available.

LIST OF LODGE OFFICERS AND MASONIC DIRECTORY FOR 2009

The next task facing the Grand Secretary's Office is compiling the Masonic Directory. At the end of November each lodge should have received a form on which to list the officers elected for the year, the address and telephone number[s] of the three principal officers and the Secretary. As soon as the officers are elected, please complete this form and send it to the Grand Secretary's Office as quickly as possible in order that we may process the information for the Directory. **DO NOT hold up the notice if a Junior Officer has not been elected or appointed at that time.** It is important that the Master and Secretary be listed in the Directory- any of the other officers may be reported at a later date as they are elected or appointed. Please note that you are to identify each officer by name and Lodge membership number. This procedure will reduce the opportunity for error in the Lodge Officer listing.

For the Directory to be meaningful, we must have it available as early as possible after the beginning of the new year. If the completed form from your lodge has not been received in the Grand Secretary's Office before **January 10, 2009**, there is a good chance the officers of your lodge will not be listed in the Directory. Please do not let this happen.

Also, on the same form, we ask that you furnish the exact address, or location, of your lodge so that it can be easily found from the information provided in the Directory. It has come to our attention a number of lodges have relocated -- or their address has been changed -- with the old address still listed in the Directory. Hope-

fully, with the information you provide, the new Directory can be brought up to date.

You should have been sent, with your officers sheet a PRE-ORDER form for ordering the Masonic Directory. Each lodge will receive one complimentary Directory. Others may be ordered through the Grand Lodge Office. The price of each will be determined by the cost of printing, plus shipping and handling.

IRS REPORTING FORM

Also, on the bottom of the Lodge Officers form mentioned above is a space to list the information required by the Internal Revenue Service from each Subordinate Lodge. The information received from the Subordinate Lodges is compiled in this office and a summary transmitted to the IRS. Failure on the part of a Lodge Secretary to respond may result in a visit from an IRS Representative -- and there are penalties involved that could be imposed for failure to report.

Be sure the form is signed by the Lodge Secretary and the seal of the Lodge is placed thereon.





Tireless volunteer named 2009 Friend of the Homes

A member of W.G. Simpson No. 472, Cardwell is a familiar face to staff and residents at Masonic Home of Shelbyville. The Home has counted on him to help with small projects and chores, or to greet guests for a special event.

When Cardwell needed recovery care following surgery, he chose Masonic Home of Shelbyville's short-stay rehab program. Earlier in 2009, he and Vicki chose the Home when she required round-the-clock nursing care until her passing June 8.

Since then, Cardwell's volunteer work has continued. Every Sunday he assists residents to church and visits at least two days a week. He and his lodge have hosted cookouts at the Home—Cardwell even caught the fish for a recent fish fry. He jump-started the Giving Tree program, and today the fund exceeds \$5,100.

"Frosty's love for the Home is remarkable," said Shelbyville Administrator Debra Finneran. "I am honored to present him with this award."

Somerset's National Treasure

Have you seen the popular movie National Treasure "Book of Secrets"? This movie portrays how the Presidents of the United States recorded historical secrets in a well worn leather book that was hidden in Washington D.C.



Somerset Masonic College which was constructed in 1865 by the members of Somerset # 111 Masonic Lodge. The College later served as the first school in what is now the Somerset Independent School System and was situated close to the present site of Somerset High School.

However, Washington D.C. is not the only place that has a book of secrets. Somerset also has a book which was only recently discovered after being lost for approximately 100 years and the secrets in this book are linked to Somerset High School. The proud slogan of the Somerset School System is, "A Tradition of Excellence since 1888" but the Somerset School System, as we know it today, evolved from a school that was built on these grounds in 1865. This school from which the Somerset Schools are descended was a Masonic College.

From a historical viewpoint, our story begins immediately after the American Civil War of 1865 when this area of Kentucky was decimated from raids by both Union and Confederate troops. As a result of the war, the economy was in shambles and there was no formal educational system available for school-age children in the community.

Realizing the need for a strong educational system to rebuild the economy, influential local men, who belonged to Somerset Masonic Lodge #111, pooled their resources and established a school for the community which granted diplomas. This school had a traditional curriculum including reading, writing, arithmetic, social studies and the trades, was constructed by the lodge in 1865, and was named the Somerset Masonic College. The school consisted of three floors. The first two floors were used as classrooms and the lodge members met on the third

floor.

The establishment of this school was of great historical importance because it was the only place in this area where children could obtain a formal education. The people, grateful for the school, celebrated the

grand opening with two nights of public speaking, dancing, and feasts.

This story comes to present day when Ms. Anne Compton, daughter, of James F. Prather Jr., recently disclosed to Cloyd J. Bumgardner, Somerset Board employee and Past Master of Woodstock Lodge, that she had an important Masonic document in her possession which was handed down to her by her father. James F. Prather was a prominent citizen in Somerset and belonged to Somerset Masonic Lodge until his death in 1991.

This well worn leather volume was the minute book from Somerset Masonic Lodge #111. It contained the minutes of the Lodge from October 18, 1873 through December 14, 1889. Ms. Compton gave the book to Mr. Bumgardner for safekeeping until the document could be reunited with Somerset Lodge #111. This historical presentation took place at the Annual District Masonic Meeting held at the Center for Rural Development by the current District Deputy Grand Master (DDGM) John W. Johnson. DDGM Johnson also recognized the importance of the document and made its presentation to Somerset Lodge a center piece of the meeting which was attended by over 350 people including Herman Forrester, Grand Master of Masons in Kentucky and other Masonic representatives from across the Commonwealth. With the benefit of 134 years of hindsight, Grand Master Forrester commented, "the Somerset Masonic College is a testa-

ment to what visionary leadership our Masonic forefathers had in this community. The act of providing for the children's education in Somerset helped pave the way for the modern day public school system." As noted in the minutes of the March 16, 1889 lodge meeting, the Masons adopted a resolution to transfer title of the Masonic College building along with its contents and the grounds to the newly formed Somerset Board of Trustees. This transfer took place for a token sum of \$3,500.00 and the process was ratified at the April 13, 1889 meeting. The deed of conveyance was approved for transfer to the Somerset Board of Trustees and this resolution is essentially the birth certificate for the present day Somerset Independent School System. Upon presenting the minute book to Somerset Lodge, Anne Compton remarked that, "the Somerset School District has always been very important to me and my family. My family all attended and graduated from Somerset High School and I am sure my father knew the historical importance of this document. He safeguarded this book for many


years so future generations could know how Somerset High School came to exist. I am proud to be able to present this minute book to Somerset Lodge for historical preservation." When Ms. Compton passed the document to David Avera, Master of Somerset Masonic Lodge, he commented that, "he was proud of the leadership that the Masonic Lodge had exhibited 134 years ago to help shape the future of this part of Kentucky. The legacy of our forefathers is still evident today through the lives touched by the Somerset School System which evolved from the Masonic College."

The Somerset Independent School System has graduated such luminaries as the revered statesman Senator John Sherman Cooper, who served on the Warren Commission, Four Star General Jack Gregory and Beau McMillan, football coach for Indiana, the Detroit Lions and the New York Jets.

The Masonic Order is Ancient with membership ranks which read like pages from a history book. Famous American members of the Masonic Order include the Father of Our Country George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Paul Revere, over 300 Union and Confederate Officers during the American Civil War, WWII Generals Douglas McArthur and Omar Bradley, Presidents Andrew Jackson, Teddy Roosevelt, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman, Gerald Ford, Astronauts Buzz Aldrin and John Glenn, Golfer Arnold Palmer, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, entertainers John Wayne, Will Rogers, Al Jolson, Red Skeleton and many other influential people in his-

tory.

Important historical American artifacts which belong to the Masonic Lodges include the Bible with which George Washington and other Presidents have taken the oath of office, and the gavel that George Washington used to set the cornerstone of the United States Capitol Building in Washington, D.C.

On November 8, 2009 Western Kentucky Widows Sons members and Brothers from over a dozen Lodges, joined with Brothers from 5 states, to host "Christmas in November" for the families and soldiers of the 2113rd Transportation Unit of the Kentucky National Guard. It seemed kind of odd, Santa on a Harley, catfish and chicken for Christmas. The 2113rd is preparing for deployment in a matter of weeks to Iraq and will not be able to have their normal Christmas activities. And while Santa, on a Harley, riding through a brand new Armory, to pass out Christmas presents seems like it would be the main event, for many kids, just being held by Dad one more time is what was most important.

Seeing this, the Brothers made some quick adjustments and put the kids on the bikes with Dad, and the party took off again. Tom, a Memphis Brother known as "TEACH" in a Santa suit and a host of elves in tow kept the kids laughing and Mom and Dad smiling all afternoon, as

the elves passed out toys to 127 children.

This program is now in its 4th year of operation. Organized by the Widows Sons of Kentucky, and put on by various Masonic Organizations and Lodges, the National Guard and Army Reserve Units are provided Christmas parties and summer family picnic events. Earlier this summer two Reserve Units were hosted to a BBQ lunch, family events, a private reserved swimming pool, and a great show by the Rizpah Temple Shrine Clowns.

This time of year it is Christmas Dinners, stockings stuffed with toys for the kids, Santa, and formal dances for the adults, as well as ceremonies and presentations put on by the Brothers, some of whom travel as many as 400 miles to be part of the events.

From Dean Owen, WM Antioch Lodge #332 (and KY State Widows Sons Treasurer), "Brothers from Indy, Louisville, Memphis, St Louis, and all over Southern Illinois come in to help

us. This year was especially difficult emotionally, this unit is going into some very, very dangerous places, and their role is an extremely dangerous one. We really wanted to show them we care, and that they will not be forgotten when

they are away defending this great Masonic idea we call America. More than 75% of the Widows Sons are prior military or law enforcement veterans, and a lot of our number are Active Duty military. We know first hand what our Brothers are going through who are in Iraq and Afghanistan and we want them to know there are men here who know their sacrifice, will help their families while deployed, and when they return we will welcome them with a Brotherhood that is as strong as what they knew in the military".

In December, these efforts will transport this unit home from Camp Shelby to Paducah and then back again over the Christmas Break. According to Capt. John Harvey, Commanding Officer of the 2113rd, "The things the Masonic Community has done, is doing, and have committed to do for my soldiers is amazing. The military will give these soldiers leave, but many are young families, they do not have the financial resources to even get home for Christmas before final deployment into combat zones. With the help of the Masons, these men and women will see their family one last time before going to war. We simply can't say enough to convey our gratitude. The other thing is how well organized they are. They literally organize and put on almost the whole day's activities, freeing up my people to work with families more one on one. When we first researched this, it was going to be a \$36,000 project, but some how,



the Masons very quietly assured us they could pull it off, and they have with no expectation of personal gain or anything. It is truly an amazing show of Brotherhood and caring, and it is so important to my Soldiers".
